

Baharya, Siwa, Dakhla Oasis & Uweinat Mountain
“ Kilf Kebir Grand Expedition ”

19 Days

Day 1:

We arrive in Cairo this afternoon and transfer to our hotel for check in.

Day 2:

After Breakfast, we drive our way to **White Desert** The Dazzling white of the chalky calcic formations are the remains of a limestone massif from the Cretaceous era, shaped out into the strangest sculptures by the ever wailing sharp wind armed at all times with strongly effective sand particles. This unique desert has no parallel in the whole world. Camping in **White desert**

Day 3:

After Breakfast Leaving the **White Desert** and heading to **Ammonite Scarp**: The arid desert ground south of Siwa was found covered by millions of marine fossils known as Ammonites because of their shape that resembles the horns of ancient God Ammon. A reminder of a long ago retreated sea. Where we will spend the night Camping

Day 4:

After Breakfast, Drive till we reach Pottery Hill known as **Abu Ballas** in Arabic used to be a reliable source for providing water to the oasis invaders or convoys heading to the oasis in the ancient times as when the early explorers visited the site, there were about 300 complete pots and amphorae at the depot, though most were broken or had man-made holes in them supporting the theory that this was the water cache referred to by the Dakhla natives, which they destroyed when pursuing the "black raiders" a few years before Rohlfs recorded the story in 1874. The existence of this depot one third of the way to Kufra led Almsy to speculate that there had to be another depot or well two thirds of the way, most probably the unknown Zarzora oasis. Unfortunately by now all the complete pots have been taken or broken, and all that remains at the site is a pile of broken shards at the foot of the hill. Where we will spend the night Camping

Day 5:

After Breakfast, Leaving the Location of **Abu Ballas** & drive our way till we reach **Wadi Wessa** Winds its way confusingly through the southernmost tip of the Gilf and contains many branches. One of the major side valleys is the Valley of the Green Earth Wadi al-Ard al -Khadra which also shows signs of human presence in the ancient past and evidence that it was once the site of a dam. Where we will spend the night Camping

Day 6:

After Breakfast, Drive our way to **Karkur Talh**: On the eastern part of Uweinat, lies a valley of spectacular caves with numerous rock arts found 1923 by Ahmed Hassanein, "Karkur" meaning small Wadi and "Talh" the local word for Acacia tree. Where we will overnight camping

Day 7:

After Breakfast,

Leaving the Location of **Karkur Talh** , and heading toward the west side of the Gilf Kebir **(B/L/D)**

Day 8:

After Breakfast,

Drive our way to our next location the **Mistikawy Cave** a newly discovered cave by Colonel El-Mestikawy on the southwestern cliffs of the Gilf Kebir plateau. Showing rock drawings of wide diversity and overlooking dry remains of an ancient lake basin with prehistoric tools. **(B/L/D)**

Day 9:

After Breakfast,

This Morning we will be heading to **Wadi Soura** At 900metres high, soaring up from the flat desert is the astounding major plateau known as the Gilf Kebir. This is where Laszlo Almasy, the real life character on whom "The English Patient" was based, Discovered, or, more accurately, rediscovered the caves containing pictures of the famous swimmers. Continue our way to the **Aqaba Pass** Discovered in 1932 by the Hungarian Explorer Lazlo Almasy during his quest for the Lost Oasis of Zorzura, Aqaba (difficult) Pass remains the main route from the East, getting down off the plateau, and the main way to get onto the plateau from the desert plains to the East.

During the Desert War, Almasy famously made use of the pass in "Operation Salama" when delivering two German spies into Egypt from Axis occupied Libya. **(B/L/D)**

Day 10:

After Breakfast,

Hamra is in fact the Arabic word for red. **Wadi Hamra** penetrates deep into the cliffs of the Gilf from the north east and splits into three separate valleys. The red sand is set off by the dramatic black backdrop of the cliffs. **(B/L/D)**

Day 11:

After Breakfast,

Silica Glass: The so-called "Libyan Glass" in the area south of the sand sea, had been formed upon the impact of a meteorite, forming a unique glass phenomenon, The Silica Glass also known as Desert Emeralds as a piece of which was recently found to feature in a piece of Tutankamun's jewelry. **(B/L/D)**

Day 12:

After Breakfast,

This morning we drive till we reach **the Great Sand Sea** this is an unbroken mass of sand stretching as much as 400km east to west across the frontiers of Libya and Egypt, lapping at the edges of the Farafra depression to the east. From north to south it spans over 600km from Siwa in the north to the Gilf Kebir plateau (also known as the Great Barrier) in the south. It is mainly made up of parallel, crisply defined dunes orientated more or less north-south. These sharp-edged dunes are known as seif – the Arabic word for sword. Some of the individual dunes are up to 100km long and can be as much as 100m high. While these seif dunes move and are aligned due to the influence of the wind, there are other dunes known as whale-back dunes which are even wider- some up to 2km wide. **(B/L/D)**



Day 13:

Today we will spend all day & overnight camping at the same location of the **Great Sand Sea**
(B/L/D)

Day 14:

After Breakfast,
This morning we will head to camp in the South of **Siwa Oasis** Location
(B/L/D)

Day 15:

Drive our way till we reach **Siwa Oasis**, where we will visit the painted tombs at **Gebel el - Mawta**, and the Ptolemaic stone – built tomb chapels of **Abu Awwaf**. The last inhabited hatiya on the eastern side of Siwa is **El -Zaytun**, constructed around a stone temple. This land was given to the Senussis and was worked by their former slaves. The village that we will visit is now abandoned, but remains of interest for its intact houses, mosque and mill. After lunch, this afternoon's touring will be to sites west of town. In **Hatiyat Khamisa**, one of the most fertile parts of Siwa, we find a small stone temple and a ridge of over 100 rock- cut tombs. Many treasure hunters have ravaged the area looking for valuables that the Queen of Khamisa is said to have buried here. Nearby is the hunters have ravaged the area looking for valuables that the Queen of Khamisa is said to have buried here. Nearby is the famous Doric-style temple and tomb at **Bilad el-Rum**. As all of these sites are situated amidst small villages, our presence will provide great entertainment for the community. Our last stops of this full day will be at the new **Siwa House Ethnographic Museum** and the medieval fortress of **Shali**, the deserted central village of the oasis founded in 1203 AD and built of salty lake mud, Drive Our Way to The Great Sand Sea ,
Overnight in Camp

Day 16:

Leaving **Siwa Oasis** behind Heading to **Baharyia Oasis**

Day 17:

After Breakfast, Drive our way to **Baharyia Oasis** where you will visit including the temple dedicated to **Alexander the Great**, the 26th Dynasty **temple of Ain el – Muffilla**, the tomb of the 19th Dynasty **Governor Amenhotep**, and the **26th Dynasty tombs** of the merchants Bannentiu and his father Djed-Amun-lufankh. A highlight will be a brief stop at the recently discovered “Valley of the Golden Mummies”, overnight in the northern Part of Baharyia

Day 18:

Driving our way **Baharyia – Cairo** Direct transfer to your Hotel for Check in

Buffet Breakfast at hotel, then you will be met by our representative and transferred to Cairo airport, where you will be helped with your check-in and immigration formalities for your flight back home.
